## The Physical and Developmental Environment of the High Risk Infant

**Program Description:** State-of-the-art medical care has progressed substantially, leading to increased survival of high risk infants. The challenge is to ensure they and their families thrive. Current research shows that ill and premature neonates are especially vulnerable to their environment because their physiologic, sensory and neurological systems are not yet mature. It is imperative as clinicians and decision-makers to understand the effects of the physical and developmental environment on neonate and their familes, particularly those which lead to adverse outcomes, developmental delay and disability.

This one day conference provides current scientific evidence for the environment's impact on human development, and describes design standards and caregiving practices needed to support change toward optimal evidence based practice.

#### **Conference goals:** This conference is designed to:

- Provide foundational information regarding the development of sensory and neurologic processes, including sensitive periods during fetal/newborn development.
- Discuss the scientific foundation for the environmental impact on the developing brain.
- Provide a perspective on the impact of architectural design in the provision of family centered care.
- Provide a perspective on the family as providing the most essential environment for a high risk newborn.
- Increase participant awareness of using evidence to influence the change process; a phenomenon involving intellectual, emotional and physical dimensions.
